Compliance Support & Strategic Engagement Program

This program, also known as CSSE, supports EPD's regulatory and conservation program efforts to improve compliance and encourage positive environmental stewardship. CSSE uses social marketing principles and methods to pursue this goal, including content creation and distribution via print materials, internet, videos, social media, public spaces and the news media.

Trending on Social Media



CSSE found new ways to expand engagement on social media, linking trends to high-profile topics such as elections to promote recycling.

Our volunteers and interns made a big difference in 2024 with 289 "eVIP" volunteers contributing 2,973 hours to EPD, valued at \$87,436.

Clean Air Campaign



CSSE used social media, internet, public spaces and more to remind everyone that clean air is vital to our health and quality of life.

Engaging With Our Community



In 2024, EPD brought fun, interactive activities to 20 community events attended by over 11,000 people.

National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Program



Also known as NPDES, this program prevents stormwater pollution and protects water quality in Orange County by monitoring and enforcing NPDES requirements under the County's Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) permit.

Training Updates

The program updated Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) training materials required under the County MS4 permit training, covering topics like Erosion & Sedimentation Control, Spill Prevention and Illicit Discharge Detection. These enhanced presentations are available internally and on

the University of South Florida-hosted Orange County Water Atlas webpage. Staff



also reached key professional milestones, achieving certifications in both Stormwater Operations and Florida Association of Code Enforcement training.

BCC Presentations



On June 4, 2024, the NPDES team provided environmental feedback and program updates to the Board of County Commissioners (BCC) in support of the Public Works presentation on Stormwater Management for Future Resiliency.

Pollution Prevention & Control Program



Also known as P2C, this program implements Orange County's Small Quantity Generator (SQG) Verification and Assessment Program, which verifies the proper management of regulated waste generated at Orange County businesses. P2C also coordinates pollution prevention and sustainability efforts, and investigates environmental complaints lodged by the County's residents.

Noise Ordinance Updates



P2C completed a comprehensive analysis of the Noise Pollution Control Ordinance and proposed revisions with input from District Commissioners, Orange County Sheriff's Office and stakeholders. The ordinance updates aim to more effectively handle citizens' noise complaints.

Pollution Prevention Week



P2 Week activities this year included a trash pickup at Sandhill Preserve, a Lunch & Learn event and a DIY experiment making a sustainable household cleaner, as well as an interesting webinar on the impact that the fast fashion industry has on our planet.

Fix It! Don't Pitch It



- 2 events

Campaign Sign Recycling



P2C partnered with local groups to recycle election campaign signs during the 2024 primary election, collecting over 14,000 signs and diverting 1,800 pounds of waste from the landfill. Their partnership in 2022 earned second place in the 2023 Florida Recycling Champion Awards.

Solid Waste Permitting & Compliance Program



The Solid Waste Permitting and Compliance program works to minimize the threats to public health and the environment by regulating the construction, operation and closure of private solid waste management facilities.

Orange County EPD performs permitting and compliance reviews for:

- Transfer Stations
- Materials Recovery Facilities (MRF)
- Yard Trash Processing Facilities


Inspections are performed monthly or quarterly and total over 90 inspections each year.



Petroleum Restoration & Brownfields Programs



The goal of the Petroleum Restoration Program (PRP) is to identify and remove petroleum contamination from soil and groundwater.

The Brownfields Redevelopment Program's goal is to restore abandoned or underused industrial and commercial properties whose redevelopment may be complicated by real or perceived environmental contamination.



Our PRP team ensured more than \$8.5 million in state funds were administered to identify, assess and clean up petroleum contaminated sites.


Orange County EPD manages a Brownfields Redevelopment Program that helps incentivize redevelopment.

Monitoring Cleanups

The PRP staff, also known as site managers, conducted 465 site visits and 88 operation and maintenance inspections.



Site managers reviewed over 1,100 site assessments, remedial action plans and monitoring reports.





Protecting Groundwater

The PRP team closed 29 cleanup sites during the 2023/2024 fiscal year.

The PRP team managed 498 petroleumcontaminated sites across three counties under contract with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection.





Petroleum Storage Tank Compliance Program



The program safeguards Orange County's groundwater resources by inspecting underground storage tank (UST) and aboveground storage tank (AST) systems for compliance with technical regulations, as contracted by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection and required under Orange County's ordinance.

Leak Prevention

Storage tanks and systems are regulated by laws intended to prevent discharges to the environment. Our compliance inspections help identify faulty components, maintenance gaps or poor operating conditions before leaks can occur.

Monitoring Compliance

EPD regulates over 6,600 tanks residing on more than 3,500 facilities across five counties. *In the 2023-2024 contract year.

Staff successfully sent three enforcement cases to the Special Magistrate and closed 13 cases through consent orders.

Development Review Program

This program protects Orange County's natural resources by reviewing industrial, commercial, office and residential development, and ensuring that they comply with environmental regulations.

One-Stop Service



TEAM 400

The program has one full-time staff member located at the County Administration Building to serve One-Stop Service Center customers.

Connecting People and Planning



EPD's Development Review Program is an integral part of Team 400 that collaborates regularly with other County divisions and EPD programs during many typical plan reviews. They are also in frequent communication with residents, developers and landowners.

Commercial Building Permits

About 7,500 commercial building permits are reviewed each year.



Development & Technical Reviews



Approximately 1,200 plan reviews are conducted annually in the Development Review Committee/ Technical Review Group process.

Plan Review Tools & Activities



The program considers the effects of past and proposed future development on all environmental media including:

- Surface Waters/Wetlands
- Protected Habitats
- Erosion/Sedimentation
- Air Quality and Noise Pollution
- Soil/Groundwater Contamination

Natural Resources Compliance & Enforcement Program



Also known as NRCE, this program's goal is to protect and conserve Orange County's natural resources by achieving compliance through standardized procedures and educational efforts committed to fairness, professionalism and excellent customer service.

Compliance and Enforcement



- 277 cases reported during fiscal year 2023-2024
- Responded to an average of 23 new cases per month
- An average of 1 case per month taken to the Special Magistrate

Lakeshore Protection

The NRCE team oversees the Lakeshore Protection Code (Ch. 15, Art. VII) and updated the Board of County Commissioners in July 2024 on permits, enforcement efforts and thriving lakeshore projects.



Enforcement Cases



Major environmental violations can lead to Special Magistrate hearings, where legal action ensures compliance and restores the environment. This process aligns with Orange County's Code Compliance approach.

Living Lakeshores Campaign

Natural Resources Permitting Program



Also known as NRP, this program's goal is to protect and conserve Orange County's natural resources by implementing the County's environmental ordinance and balancing environmental protection of natural resources with sustainable development.

Permit Inspections



360 inspections were completed to determine compliance with permit conditions and address non-compliance issues with permittees.

Permit Applications



The NRP team reviewed more than 5,500 building permits during the fiscal year 2023-2024. In addition, over 500 permit applications specifically checked for compliance with Chapters 15 and 33 of the Orange County Code. These reviews include:

Green PLACE Program



Green PLACE (Park Land Acquisition for Conservation and Environmental Protection) enhances habitats through the preservation of environmentally sensitive lands and land management activities. This program protects natural and water resources in Orange County and provides nature-based recreational opportunities.

Land Acquisition

Since 2021, the Green PLACE Program has evaluated 1,523 parcels and appraised 129. The Board of County Commissioners approved 43 contracts, preserving 1,760.52 acres of environmentally sensitive land.

The seven-member Green PLACE Advisory Board advises Orange County on issues involving Orange County's natural resources and efforts on public engagement. Recent progress included a mission statement and brand plan.

Lake Management Program

This program's mission is to manage 38 lake taxing districts (MTSU/MSBU) and 15 advisory boards. We work to address local lake concerns such as aquatic plant management, water quality improvement, general lake maintenance, navigation and off-duty lake patrols.



The Lakes program manages over 16,000 acres of surface water by controlling invasive plants, promoting native biodiversity, and enhancing safety and recreation.



Best Management Practices

- 2 alum stormwater treatment facilities
- 8 lakes stocked with 962 triploid grass carp for biological control on 2,325 acres
- 488 acres of exotic and invasive aquatic plants treated via herbicide control
- 4,353 miles of roads swept
- 780,900 pounds of debris prevented from entering lakes using 900 stormwater filtration devices

Project Highlights: Lake Roberts

The Lake Roberts community saw the planting of 1,030 new aquatic plants to restore their lakeshore and prevent erosion.





Lake Killarney

Lake Killarney benefited from the removal of a sandbar that had accumulated at the outfall off Blue Heron Drive.





Chapter 8 Boats & Water Safety Ordinance



The Lakes program continues updating its Boats and Water Safety Code to improve safety for boaters and protect the natural resources of Orange County's waterways.



Revisions include adding new boating safety zones, ensuring the code aligns with Florida's Uniform Waterway Marker Permit

requirements and removing outdated language. These revisions are in collaboration with the Florida Fish & Wildlife

Water Sciences Program



This program helps preserve and restore the quality of freshwater resources in Orange County through water sampling, laboratory analyses and data-driven solutions aimed at identifying, capturing and removing pollutants.

Water Quality Monitoring



Sampled 648 sites for the Water Quality Trend Network Program. Sampled 63 sites related to special projects for Orange County Fire Rescue, hurricane recovery, etc.

Biological Monitoring



The Water Sciences program conducted 15 Lake Vegetation Index (LVI) and 13 Stream Condition Index (SCI) Assessments. An LVI assesses the health of a lake by observing the diversity of the plant community. An SCI assesses the health of a stream through collection, identification and analysis of the benthic macroinvertebrate community. Our lab has been audited by FDEP and is certified to submit SCI data to them for water body assessment purposes.

Groundwater Vulnerability Assessment (GVA)

Phase I completed: **Identified Orange County Priority Vulnerability Areas** (PVAs) in need of additional protection from septic nutrient pollution. The Board of **County Commissioners** approved changes to Chapter 37 Wastewater Code in November 2024. Additional protections within these Orange County PVAs will become effective March 1, 2025.

Microbial Source Tracking (MST)



In partnership with the University of Central Florida, select water samples undergo genetic microbial testing to determine the biological source of certain excess nutrients. MST aids in preventing water impairment.

Lab Activity



The Orange County EPD
Laboratory is certified by the
Department of Health/National
Environmental Laboratory
Accreditation Program (DOH/
NELAP) to verify compliance with
the Florida Administrative Code.
This ensures the lab meets the
specific standards and generates
high-quality and reliable data
for environmental testing/
monitoring. EPD's lab is certified
for E. coli, color, turbidity and
Chlorophyll a.

Lah Audit



The Orange County EPD Laboratory is audited every two years required by DOH/NELAP to verify compliance with the Florida Administrative Code. Once again, in 2024, the lab passed the external audit.
